In 1989, in a conversation at the Chelsea Arts Club, with Peter Peterson RBA, Sandra Pepys (then chair of the Society of Landscape Painters), Dennis Gilbert NEAC, Cinzia Bonada RBA and others, it was mentioned that many of them often painted small scale works and that it would be a good idea if there were a forum for exhibiting such works. The potential membership was discussed and a shortlist of names agreed on and the Small Paintings Society - subsequently renamed the Small Paintings Group - was founded.

It was agreed to approach Duncan Miller at his then gallery in Hampstead (now in Bury Street SW1) and he welcomed the idea to include only small paintings. The inaugural exhibition of the Small Paintings Group was at the Duncan Miller Gallery, 17 Flask Walk, Hampstead NW3 starting on the 1st of December 1991. It was composed of some thirty painters from many of the exhibiting societies including a number of Royal Academicians, and these formed the founding membership of the Group. Membership is limited to a maximum of 35 artists.

Paintings exhibited with the SPG are limited to 12" by 12" or 144 square inches in area and may be in any medium. Although many of our members also work on a much larger scale, the discipline involved in making small and intimate paintings demands a conciseness and directness all of its own and their affiliation to the Small Paintings Group reflects their appreciation of a forum where they can exhibit their smaller 'cabinet' sized paintings in sympathetic company in different venues across the country.

These smaller works also have the advantage of fitting comfortably into the modern domestic environment where space may be limited – although, it is said, for the true collector a lack of space should never be a deterrent to adding to their collection!

Since its inauguration The Group has had over fifty exhibitions in London, Southern and Southeast England and also Jersey. Galleries include Piers Feetham Gallery, Fulham; the Russell Gallery, Putney; the Edmund Gallery, Suffolk; Wimbledon Fine Art; Chappel Galleries, Colchester; the Jerram Gallery, Sherborne; Geedon Gallery, Essex; Century Fine Art, Datchet; Highgate Contemporary Art and several others.

Rachel Arif MAFA ASWA



Rachel is an award-winning artist originally from Rochdale, Lancashire. She currently lives in London with her husband and two children. She is a regular exhibitor at Mall Galleries, where she has shown her work alongside The Royal Society of British Artists, NEAC, the SWA and The Pastel Society, each on several occasions.

Rachel is better known for her atmospheric sea and landscapes, which are gestural, heartfelt and emotional. Her own story starts in Rochdale, Lancashire, where as a child her deep affection for drawing led her to be regularly scolded by teachers for drawing in her text books. She studied History of Art at Manchester College of Art before developing a successful office-based career within the

heart of vibrant Soho. Eventually, she left her corporate life behind and took up painting full-time.

In her studio, she surrounds herself with naturally found objects such as wild flowers, dried lavender, old fishing nets and driftwood. She collects old photos of people and places, each of which have an emotional connection and a story to tell. She uses some of these as inspiration for her drawings and paintings.

Richard Baker



Richard Baker (b. 1971) lives and works in Leeds, UK. He holds a BA (Hons) in Fine Art from Leeds Metropolitan University and an MA in Creative Practice from Leeds Arts University. His work has been exhibited widely, both nationally and internationally, including at museums in China, The San Francisco Arts Institute, the National Museum of Poland in Gdansk, the Mall Galleries, London, and the Royal Academy of Arts, London.

He won the Wells Art Contemporary Patron's Prize, 2020, and The Hix Award, 2019. He was shortlisted for the Jackson's Painting Prize, 2020, and was runner up in the London Contemporary Art Prize, 2019. He was selected for the John Moores Painting Prize exhibition at the Walker Gallery, Liverpool in 2018. His work is included in the Priseman -Seabrook collection of 21st Century British painting and is held in many private collections worldwide.

Richard Baker's small to medium scale oil paintings depict mid-century furniture and sometimes clothing, or other items. Reimagined from found photographs, these unpeopled and modestly scaled works invite the viewer to consider the hidden human histories behind seemingly insignificant objects. Often ignored, these objects bear witness to sensuous activity, be it lived, remembered, or mythologised.

The objects are presented dislocated and isolated, and appear as unadorned, formal arrangements in a restaging of the interrelationship between material, image, object, and time. Much of the meaning in these paintings comes from what is left unsaid, what is absent from the image, what is alluded to.

Cinzia Bonada RBA



"CINZIA" BONADA RBA nee Cynthia Boyd, adopted the Italian pseudonym whilst dancing in Italy. She trained as a classical dancer at the Bush Davies School winning the Adeline Genee Medal in 1955 before joining The Royal Ballet School. Rather tall for ballet she danced on the continent for some years before meeting her future husband, Johnny Bonada (Chef d'orchestre at the Sporting Club, Monte Carlo).

She became a full time painter when the family, Laura, Jenny and John came to live in England. She painted with Charles Fowler in Richmond, undertaking many portrait commissions (especially of children).

The first painting accepted at the RA Summer Exhibition was in 1975, "Le petit chalet".

She has exhibited with the RA, NEAC, RBA, RP, New Grafton Gallery, the

Affordable Art Show at Olympia, Fine Art and Antiques Exhibition, John Iddon Fine Art show of Contemporary Art, Gallery 47, Great Russell Street and the Drawing Fair at the RCA.

Her work is at present in Drapers Hall, London, Art Workers Guild (portrait of Dennis Flanders RBA), Royal Mid-Surrey Golf Club (portrait of Sir John Hill FRS), Lampeter University, Wales and private collections in the British Isles, USA, Canada, Iceland, Japan and on the continent.

Cinzia paint portraits, landscape and still life in oils and mixed media and admires and is influenced by Vuillard, Bonnard and Bernard Dunstan RA.

She became a full member of the RBA in 1993 and is a founder member of the Small Paintings Group.

Born in London, Francis studied at St. Martins School of Art and Chelsea School of Art in London. He has taught drawing and painting part time at all levels up to post-graduate.

Elected an associate to the Royal Watercolour Society in 1986, he became a full member in 1991 and served as President of the Society 2000-03. He was elected to the New English Art Club in 1992.

Exhibits regularly at the Royal Watercolour Society and the New English Art Club. Featured artist at the R.W.S. in 1991. Awards include W.H. Patterson Fine Arts Award. The Arts Club Prize at the 226th Royal Academy Summer Exhibition. Francis has been an invited artist to the Discerning Eye Exhibition.


He was invited by REME to Camp Bastion, Afghanistan as a War Artist, 2013. He won the Turner Award for a picture of Camp Bastion in 2014.

Liz Butler RWS MA (RCA)



Liz Butler was born in Cumbria and educated at Liverpool College of Art and the Royal College of Art. She is well known for her miniature paintings of gardens, and her use of pure watercolour.

Her work is held in several major collections including the Government Art Collection, Abbot Hall Gallery, Kendal, the Royal Collection, Harewood House, Qingdao Art Museum, China, and the National Postal Archive. She was elected a Member of the Royal Watercolour Society in 1996, where she exhibits regularly in their Annual Spring and Autumn Exhibitions.

The Francis Kyle Gallery represented her from 1978, where she had three solo exhibitions and exhibited regularly in their mixed themed exhibitions.

Four of her paintings were recently selected for an exhibition at the RWA, Bristol, entitled "Air, Visualising the Invisible in British Art 1768 - 2017."

They were from a series of paintings entitled Fragile Earth, which were painted from material she had collected from various aeroplane flights, and is an ongoing project. The changing of the earth over time, through climate change and geological change is of great interest to her. She is presently continuing to work on this series and is working on some aerial views of the Siberian Steppes.

"I like my paintings to look as though they have been made by magic, avoiding any visible brush marks. I mainly work in watercolour, sometimes I draw with a pencil, but I prefer to go straight in with the brush. Like handwriting, the language an artist uses in the making of a painting is very definitely his or her own. Even if the materials they use and their working methods have much in common with those used by other artists, there is always something in their paintings which defines their identity."

Joyce Cairns PPRSA DEd(hc) HRHA HRWA ...



Joyce W. Cairns PPRSA DEd(hc) HRHA HRWA HRBA RSW MA(RCA) HRA(2018 -2022) was born and brought up in Edinburgh. She studied painting at Grays School of Art, Aberdeen from 1966 -71 and The Royal College of Art, London 1971 -74. She was awarded a Fellowship at Gloucester College of Art and Design, Cheltenham 1974-75 returning to London where she did the Art Teacher's Certificate Course at Goldsmiths College, University of London 1975-76.

In 1976 she returned to Aberdeen where she taught Drawing and Painting at Grays School of Art until 2004 when she took early retirement to complete the vast body of work which culminated in 'War Tourist'. It was exhibited for 3 months in 2006 at Aberdeen Art Gallery, attracting nearly 30,000 visitors. 'War Tourist' was partly

based on her father's war backed up by extensive research following in his footsteps through Europe and Tunisia.

Her work is mainly autobiographical based on past memories intertwined with present experiences, woven around the backcloth of the once fishing village of Footdee at the mouth of Aberdeen harbour where she lived for 35 years. She now splits her time between Footdee and Broughty Ferry in Dundee where she has relocated her studios to a house and large garden overlooking the river Tay, which adds a further dimension to her work.

Joyce Cairns has been exhibiting since 1969 and her work is held in numerous private and public collections, both here and abroad.

On the 28th November 2018 Joyce was elected first woman President of the Royal Scottish Academy in 193 years finishing her term of office in November 2022.

Jane Corsellis NEAC RWS



Jane studied at the Byam Shaw School of Art in London. She was awarded the Leverhulme Scholarship and the final year Painting Prize. While still a student she exhibited at the Young Contemporaries Exhibition and at the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition.

After leaving the Byam Shaw in 1962 she painted for a year in Spain before returning to teach for two years. In 1972 she moved with her family to Hong Kong where she had a solo exhibition. Having returned to England for a few years, she then moved to Ottawa for three years again having a solo exhibition. Subsequently she lived for a further three years in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia; while there she visited and painted in India, Thailand, Bali and Australia. Since then she has spent some months

painting in Italy and made various trips to France and Spain as well as making another trip to India. In the UK she paints in London and in Pembrokeshire in South Wales.

Since 1985 she has had a series of very successful solo exhibitions at the New Academy Gallery in London, the last being in November 2004. In 1998 she had a solo exhibition at the Hollis Taggart Gallery in New York. She exhibits regularly at exhibitions of the New English Art Club, the Royal Watercolour Society, and from time to time in other galleries and exhibitions. She was a finalist in the Garrick Milne portrait competition. She has produced a number of lithographs with the Curwen Studio. Her book Painting Figures in Light was published by Watson and Guptill in 1982. A book Jane Corsellis A Personal View Painting in Oils and Watercolour was published by David and Charles in October 2000. At the same time APV Films brought out a film of Jane at work called Landscapes in Oils. A second film on Coastal Watercolours was brought out by APV Films in November 2004. Her work is in numerous corporate and private collections in the UK, North America, Europe and Far East.

PJ Crook MBE RWA FRSA



PJ Crook MBE (born 1945) is an English painter and sculptor.

From a studio opposite her house, she manages compositions on a monumental scale - paintings can measure 2 × 4.5 metres and also paints small pictures, some no larger than 10 cm square. She works in tinted gesso, acrylic and sometimes in oil on canvas. She often paints crowds, either in motion in urban environments or standing still reading newspapers, many of which are on undulating 3D corrugated structures as with "The Smell of the Horse, the Roar of the Crowd" (coll. Cheltenham Art Gallery & Museum), "Other Mothers' Sons" (coll. Imperial War Museum, London), "Paper Hat" and "The Kiss" (coll. Morohashi Museum of Modern Art, Japan). These have led onto her three dimensional

sculptures mainly constructed out of found objects.

PJ is a Patron of the National Star College Cheltenham; a Patron of Linc; a Patron of Artshape; a sometime Trustee and director of ACS (the Artists' Collecting Society); Patron of Cheltenham Open Studios; a Gloucestershire Ambassador; President of the Friends of Cheltenham Art Gallery & Museum; member of the Royal West of England Academy; Manchester Academy of Fine Arts. She is a member of the Chelsea Arts Club and the Honourable Company of Gloucestershire.

PJ has an honorary Doctor of Arts from the University of Gloucestershire and is an honorary vice President of Gloucestershire College. She was appointed Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) in the 2011 Birthday Honours for services to art.







Louise Diggle PS



I'm a plein air painter. I work on the spot, outside, with the subject directly in front of me. I'm London based and my studio is at Wimbledon Art Studios. I regularly go on painting trips and love the unexpected and rich colours of India and the South of France. I studied at the City and Guilds of London Art School and CCAT (now Anglia Ruskin University). I was an art teacher for over 20 years teaching both children and adults before I became a full time painter 10 years ago.

My work is all about the exploration of light - the way it hits and transforms places, objects and people. There are two light shows a day, sunrise and sunset and everything in between; never ending subject matter.

I have used soft pastels for most of my life. What I love about pastels are the glowing colours that can be used rapidly and spontaneously.

Equipment

The very nature of working outside does dictate the size. Portability is the key. In my backpack I have a Heinemann pastel box which contains all the pastels I need, a tripod, pastel card folder, storage boards, ruler and masking tape. I carry a stool and a Mabef easel if I want to work bigger. It's difficult to work out what colours you need so I take a wide variety. I've come a cropper by leaving something behind so many times. I mainly use Sennelier and Unison pastels. I layer over colours until I feel I've hit the right spot. I use a mid to dark ground and Canson Mi Teintes is my preferred pastel card. Often the subject will dictate the colour of the ground so I take a variety with me. I like the flannel grey particularly in London as it's very much a colour I see around me.

Dennis Gilbert NEAC

Lisa loves painting people and animals involved in everyday life and domestic activities in a colourful and cheerful way. A few years living in rural France and on a narrowboat provide many an inspiration. Now based in Wimbledon, rows of terraced homes and allotments, horse riding and dog walking on the Common are current themes.

She went to Camberwell School of Art obtaining a BA with Honours and worked as a freelance illustrator for 3 years for Radio Times, BBC for Schools and various publishing houses. She was nominated for the Kate Greenaway Award for 'Gudrun' published by Kestrel books.

She was elected to the Royal Institute of Painters in Watercolours in 1996 and the Society of Graphic Fine Artists in 2015.

Prizes include Dry Red Press Award in 2015, Kingsmead Award in 1997 and a commendation at the Royal Institute of Painters in Water Colours in 1994. She has won prizes in the Artist of the Year competition run by Artists and Illustrators magazine in 2008 and 2018. Charlotte was born in 1935. She studied at the Royal Academy Schools, London where, under the influence of Henry Rushbury and Albert Richardson, she began to find her own voice as an artist. She was awarded the Silver Medal for drawing and her talent was soon recognized in the world outside the Academy.

Commissions started to roll in while she was still a student. The most important was for the engineers constructing the Shell Centre in the late 1950's for whom she produced 16 large drawings as the project developed, starting with the foundations and continuing during the years it took to complete. This commission set her on the road as a professional freelance artist that she continues to be today.

Charlotte has exhibited widely in group exhibitions in London. She has been Keeper of the New English Art Club since 1989 and her work has won many awards. Her sensitive and poetic interpretations are always in demand.


Caroline McAdam Clark RWS




I am a landscape painter, working in oils or tempera direct from the subject - best described as painting en plein air.

I travel abroad to warm and colourful places, particularly South Africa. At home in London I spend many happy hours in the nearby Fulham allotments, in St James's Park and thereabouts, and on the banks of the River Thames. I keep a small canal boat, converted as a floating studio, on the Thames in Oxfordshire; this gives me the opportunity to paint wherever I choose up and down the river. Cornwall is another favourite location.

For practical reasons I work on a small scale. This makes it easier to carry my gear (try taking an easel and a large, wet canvas on the London Underground in rush hour!). More important, it enables me to complete a painting in one session before there is too much of a change in the direction of the light. I can revisit the scene on another day but the light and, for example, the state of the tide, will never be quite the same. Also, small paintings are affordable, and space can always be found for them.


People often comment on the tranquillity of my landscapes. If only they knew what a struggle it can be to achieve this effect, working fast in ever-changing weather and often in noisy and distracting environments! Now and then in the studio I work up larger versions of my small canvases, aspiring to reproduce the excitement of immediate response achieved in the original. Painting is always a challenge.





In 2021 I was an invited artist for the exhibition Past Times New Horizons to celebrate 70 years of the Kings Lynn Festival.






